

Manchester Mutual Building Society launched

MANDEVILLE, Mr., April 18 (From our special correspondent): A new society, the Manchester Building Society, was formed on Thursday, April 12, at the inaugural meeting of the society, at the old Mandeville Country Club. The meeting was presided over by Mr. L. P. Delapenha, solicitor for the society.

After tea was served to the 150 people present, Mr. Ernest Clark, chairman of the board of directors, of the society, addressed the meeting. He outlined the aims and objects of the society, summing them up in two words 'Homes' and 'Thrift'. He said that the Manchester Mutual Building Society was designed to help its members save regularly and systematically, and especially in the poorer classes to have the security of owning their own homes.

"I have one regret", said the chairman, "and that is that there are none of the peasant class present. Those really fine men

and women who are the making of a building society and for whom a building society is designed".

At this point he announced the names of the members of the board of directors. They were: Messrs. A. S. Nunes, businessman; Guy Harris planter and pen-keeper; A. L. Blake, proprietor of the National Bakery; C. D. Lord, electrician; A. R. Scott, businessman; M. S. Josephs, businessman; A. D. Thompson member of the board of directors of Alumina Jamaica Limited; and Drs. H. L. Henriques and G. Lumsden. He said that these men, all of them successful people, had offered to give voluntary service for the cause of the society.

Mr. Clark ended by saying that it was desirable that the Manchester Mutual be the biggest and most prosperous building society and that all Manchester should

become members.

The types of shares were briefly discussed by Mr. C. Muschette, the secretary.

Speeches of encouragement to join the society, and assurance in its policy, were made by the chairman of the function, and solicitor of the Society Mr. L. P. Delapenha, Messrs. J. L. Lord and C. Levy.
