

Mr. C. G. Campbell Dies In America.

Was Secretary For 45 Years Of Permanent Building Society

The Gleaner regrets to announce the death in Brooklyn, New York, of Mr. Colin George Campbell, for many years Secretary of the Jamaica Permanent Building Society. The sad event took place on Saturday morning and the news was conveyed in a cable which was received in Kingston by Mr. Donald Campbell, brother of the deceased.

The late Mr. Campbell, who was about 65 years of age was born in Kingston and was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. George Bernard Campbell. He was educated at the Kingston Collegiate School and was

the medalist for mathematics. After leaving school he started to work with the late Mr. William Schiller, who carried on a dry goods business. Leaving this employment Mr. Campbell joined the staff of the Jamaica Permanent Building Society. He was connected with this institution for 45 years and had been its Secretary for over 40 years. He retired on his well earned and deserved pension two years ago. At the last meeting of the Board of Directors of the Society before Mr. Campbell gave up office fitting tribute was paid to his work by the members.

The deceased made many friends during the period he was connected with the Society and was regarded as an authority on building society management and technique.

AS A CITIZEN

Mr. Campbell was a model to many. He was honest, courteous and sympathetic. There were many who sought his advice when in trouble of any kind and although of a retiring disposition, he was sought out by many for counsel and social intercourse. He was well known in Masonic circles in Jamaica, being a past Master of the Kingston Lodge and a member of the District Grand Lodge of Jamaica.

The deceased left Jamaica in April last year for Brooklyn, taking up residence with his family who has been residing in America for some time.

Mr. Campbell is survived by his wife, children and grandchildren, Mrs. M. Mould, a sister, living in

California and Mr. Donald Campbell, of the Jamaica Permanent Building Society.
